ASK THE ARCHITECT:


Q: Which is the better siding to use on my house: wood composite (like LP SmartSide) or cement board (like James Hardie)?

A: This is a fairly common question, and my initial answer is often: Ask your builder what they like to use! The truth is that both products are highly regarded, and often times the pros and cons of using one or the other balance out. Generally, if a builder is trying to keep up-front costs down, they'll often recommend the LP product, since it's lighter weight, easier to handle, and doesn't generate cement dust when cutting. Time is money, and for many builders the LP product allows them to work faster. James Hardie's cement board siding has some other advantages, however, like being more fire and pest resistant. Those advantages might be fairly important to some home owners! Hardie siding is also, in my opinion, visually more like real wood lap siding. As with many material decisions, making a final selection can take some time if you're on the fence about the pros and cons. On custom home projects, the architect will discuss material selections with your builder ahead of time so that you get exactly what you want!
